Cultural Resources Consultations


- A number of cultural resources surveys have been conducted in and around the Project Area.
- Evidence of both prehistoric and historic use and occupation has been found in the Project Area.
- No adverse effects would occur to any historic properties (i.e., cultural resources eligible for the National Register of Historic Places) within the proposed disturbance areas.
- Colorado Division of Reclamation, Mining and Safety has consulted with the Colorado State Historic Preservation Officer regarding effects to historic properties.
- Tribes with an interest in the region surrounding the Project area have been informed of the proposed Project. During the course of this Environmental Assessment, the Office of Surface Mining Reclamation and Enforcement will consult with the Colorado State Historic Preservation Officer, as required by Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act.

Cultural Resources Mitigation

- If any unanticipated discoveries, including human remains, are discovered during mining activities, all work in the vicinity of the find(s) would cease until the discoveries are evaluated, necessary mitigation is satisfactorily completed, and permission to resume mining is given.
- The Colorado State Historic Preservation Officer would be notified of any unanticipated discoveries.
- A Colorado-permitted archaeologist would evaluate any affected cultural resources before mining-related activities commence and periodically review historic properties for potential mining effects as required.
